

ABOUT OUR KURA

West End School was established in 1884 and then relocated to its present site in 1926. Nestled near the centre of New Plymouth it provides quick and easy access to such features as the port, Ngamotu Beach, Coastal Walkway, Puke Ariki Museum, Library, Art Gallery, NP Aquatic Centre etc. A particularly attractive school, our buildings sit snugly at the top of four terraced levels, which culminate in a broad expanse of playing fields, and recreational areas. Many large mature native trees stand dotted around the grounds and are accompanied by small pockets of native gardens. Completing a park-like appearance is the Mangaotuku Stream (fenced) which winds its way through the bottom of the grounds and Te Repo, our Wetland.



Enrolment Zone

To manage the enrolments and the space available within our school we have an enrolment zone. This means that students who live inside our zone automatically are entitled to attend our school. If you live outside of our zone you must apply for a place. We have two out of zone enrolment periods. The first in September for the start of the following year and one in July for the second half of the year. Information of our zone can be found on our school website.

School Structure

Two syndicate teams operate at West End Te Kura \overline{O} Morere Senior classes are led by Associate Principal Peter Horne, and junior classes are led by fellow Associate Principal Catherine Cooper. Supporting the work done by the classroom teachers are additional Part Time teachers, and Teacher Aides who further provide valuable learning enhancement opportunities for all our students.

Parent Involvement

Positive and supportive school-community relationships are enjoyed by the school with hardworking and competent Board of Trustees and Fund Raising & Social Committee members operating in tandem with staff members to enhance the quality of education that our students receive. Significant numbers of parents ably support us in a myriad of ways both in and out of the classroom. i.e. sports coaching, accompanying us on trips and Outdoor experiences, providing 'hands on', in-class assistance etc. We are fortunate to have this level of parental support, it is a credit to the many who so unselfishly give of their time and energy.



School Curriculum

While our major focus as a school is the delivery of the 'rich' NZ Curriculum, sports, music and cultural opportunities and structured lunchtime activities are recognised as a special feature of West End Te Kura Ō Mōrere life. Seasonally the school coaches and provides regular weekly games for teams in netball, basketball, touch and hockey, with rugby played as part of interschool sports exchanges. Many teachers participate as part of a structured lunchtime duty programme in the teaching of choir, minor games and garden club, ukulele/guitar etc. which give pupils extra options to gain both enjoyment and educational opportunities in a less formal learning context. In addition we have an active Kapa Haka Roopu that performs at local competitions and school based events.

Absences

It would be helpful if ALL absences were notified via a phone call to school prior to 9.00am. Our Phone No. is 758 9331 / 027020604266 OR via our HERO app

If the office is temporarily unattended, a message can be left on the answer phone. Should children not arrive and there has been no reason phoned in, you will be contacted to clarify the situation. As you will understand, contact from home for each absence is critically important. Please make every effort to keep the school office notified of any changes to home address, phone numbers, emergency contacts etc.

A reminder that legally, school aged children are required to be at school daily. West End Te Kura \overline{O} Morere children with patterns of 'at risk' attendance or late arrival will receive a letter from the school to make parents aware of the situation and truancy services will be contacted.



Arrival at School

8.15am is the earliest permissible arrival time, with 8.30-8.45am being the preferred time slot.

Please ensure your child is arriving sufficiently prior to 8.55am to enable him/her to appropriately prepare for the school day. Late arrivals frustrate all, particularly the classroom teacher and only serves to embarrass the child themselves. Students arriving after 9.00am must go to the office prior to going to their classrooms.

Assemblies

SCHOOL ASSEMBLIES generally occur once a fortnight on a Friday afternoon 12.20pm – 1.00pm. TEAM ASSEMBLIES occur every other Friday for Senior school and Junior school. All school and team assemblies take place in the hall, which is situated beneath the Administration building. Included during assemblies are notices, recognition of our 'Te Taura Whiri' Values and meritable work and behaviour, presentations, school singing, etc.

Bikes and Scooters

Owing to congested road ends and entrances to the school, we do not actively encourage our students to bike to school, but for the few who do, provision is made for their bicycles and scooters to be stored in stands within the grounds.

It is the responsibility of all bike & scooter owners to ensure that all bikes & scooters are locked while at school and also that cyclists wear helmets while biking to and from West End Te Kura \bar{O} Morere

For safety reasons, all bikes must be wheeled along both Davies Lane and Bonithon Avenue before and after school. Our preference is that skateboards are only brought to school on special events such as Wheels Days.

Cell Phones

We do not allow the use of mobile phone at school, however if they are required to be at school they must be handed into classroom teachers for safe keeping at the beginning of the school day. Any child who does not hand in their phone will have to have it stored in the office and a parent will be contacted to pick it up.

Communication

Our school office is open from 8.00am-4.00pm each day. Christine Hurrell and Tracy Hills will be able to help you with any questions you have. If you have a question about your child's learning please contact the classroom teacher. We use a digital platform called HERO to share newsletters, learning progress, reports ect. This is free to download and you will be given a login via your email address.



Behaviour Support

All teachers and staff focus on building students self esteem and empathy through teaching positive behaviour expectations with students. All the staff have been trained in the Incredible Years program, which focuses on nurturing children's social, emotional and academic competence. This forms the basis for our behaviour management system. We celebrate students who show our school shared values (Te Taura Whiri) by recognition in assemblies and by rewarding students with bronze, silver and gold wrist bands. This encourages the majority of students to make good choices and have a positive attitude at school. Sometimes there are factors which can cause negative behaviour. These might be traumatic experiences, something has not gone well in the class/playground, physiological challenges, lack of food or warm clothing or many other reasons. We support students with their big emotions through calming strategies, restorative conversations, listening and sharing advice. We also at times need to contact whanau to help with finding solutions. Sometimes with more serious behaviour issues we work with the Resource Teachers of Learning and Behaviour (RTLB), Te Mahau Learning Support, external agencies to develop behaviour and safety plans. The school can legally stand-down, suspend or even exclude students from West End Te Kura Ō Morere if the Principal decides that the child's behaviour is harmful and dangerous. We do not want children to miss out on their right to education. We will always try and find solutions to support children with their behaviour. We are advocates for all our students.



Food and Drink

For what are obvious nutritional reasons, morning teas and lunches are not to include fizzy / energy drinks (water being the only option), iceblocks of any description, lollies, chocolate bars. We would appreciate your cooperation in this matter. Please do your best to ensure you provide a balanced nutritious lunch that your child is going to eat and enjoy.

'Munch Crunch' takes place around 10am and is a time for our tamariki to rehydrate and refuel eating 'real food', ideally fresh fruit, veges, nuts etc. We are hoping that West End Te Kura \overline{O} Morere parents will take an active role in the growing awareness of how food, especially sugar, affects growing bodies.

Fundraising and Social Committee

The Fundraising & Social Committee meets regularly throughout the year for the planning of social and fund-raising activities. Membership is open to all interested parents. We desperately need more parents to help with activities to help fund exciting resources for the school. The committee have supported the school with funding junior swimming lessons, senior rewards day and the development of the sandpit.

School Donations

For 2024 our Board of Trustees is once again involvement in the Government's donations scheme thereby freeing up our parents and whanau from this potential cost. There will continue to be some payments for 'optional activities outside the curriculum' that will need parent payment. Parents will be notified of these as they occur.



Kapa Haka, Te Reo & Tikanga

Early in the new year, interested Year 3 – 6 tamariki will have the opportunity to join our Kapa Haka Roopu. Expertly led by Kaiako Matua Peter Taylor and valued staff and parental assistance these tamariki will be encouraged to extend their knowledge of both Te Reo and Tikanga Maori. The group, where possible, performs at our local Inter School Kapa Haka Competitions.

Matua Peter supports staff in their classrooms with delivering te reo and tikanga lessons. Teachers are also improving their understanding of te reo and attend regular professional development in becoming better with their language skills.

Parents are welcome to support our school with sharing their te reo skills. We value the support of our whanau and our hapu and iwi.

Personal Property

Please ensure ALL items of clothing and property, which regularly accompany children to school, are clearly named. Our hassles would be much fewer and the finances of some families much healthier were this to be done. Property that is found at school and which is un-named, is stored outside Room 7. Please feel free to rummage through it when you are visiting the school - you may be pleasantly surprised with what you recognise. At the end of each term, unclaimed items are recycled.

NB. NO toys or items of personal value are to be brought to school.



Newsletters

Newsletters will be posted on our app HERO. These will also be published on our school website. Please make sure you read these newsletters as it contains important information and upcoming events.

Sun Safety

To minimise the risk of our students developing skin cancers in later life, approved bucket style hats (NOT caps) are to be worn during the summer terms while playing or working outside. It would be advisable to parents to give your child an added layer of proven sunscreen protection prior to coming to school over the hotter months. Children eat their lunch in shadier areas, which also helps to reinforce positive awareness of smart sun safety behaviour. Please endeavour to ensure that children leave for school during summer, wearing a hat. Those children not wearing the correct bucket style lids will sit outside interval/lunchtimes under a designated shade area.

Swimming

When and where possible, senior classes are timetabled to swim daily throughout February and early March. Our school pool is no longer in use and senior team students use Devon Intermediate's pool with our junior team classes yet again scheduled to receive instruction at the NP Aquatic Centre early Term 2.

As instructional swimming is part of the school programme, we have an expectation that all children will be active participants. Please ensure that your child brings their togs to school each day. Non swimmers are required to supply a parental note.



Traffic Safety

For the protection of all, we urge children and parents to safely use the various pedestrian crossings dotted around West End Te Kura \bar{O} Mörere and Devon Intermediate School when crossing St Aubyn Street and Devon Street West.

West End Te Kura \overline{O} Morere students are to take extreme care when using these both before and after school. In addition, each afternoon, Senior Leadership personnel supervise our students using our Belt Road Kea Crossing with a school patrol team operating between 3.00-3.15pm daily. Added to this, the Devon Street West top pedestrian crossing is supervised by Senior Leadership personnel each morning (8.15 – 8.45am) and covered in the afternoon (3.00-3.15pm).

The 2012 New Plymouth District Council redevelopment of Davies Lane has provided our school community with a much safer and attractive transition entrance to our school site.

A reminder, vehicle access in and out of Davies Lane is restricted to residents only.

West End Te Kura \overline{O} Morere parents are required to park legally and safely in surrounding streets and if required "walk in" with our students. Please do your bit to keep all our staff and students safe.

Be warned!! New Plymouth District Council Officers do regular patrols and ticket offenders.

We work closely with the Lets Go team. Often student leaders give away prizes to students who are coming to school on bikes, scooters or walking. Let's Go is part of the New Plymouth District Council and are focused on enabling a safer network for people to ride or walk into schools.



STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT

All children have high, yet realistic expectations placed on them, to consistently perform to their best level whether this be relating to their personal attitude, behaviour or work habits. Irrespective of their age our West End Te Kura Ō Mōrere learners have personal ownership of all these three important areas central to success at school and life. All are expected to display a positive attitude and to try.

Additional to this, we have a focus on the development of our 6 Learner Competencies actively promoting our students as Thinkers, Communicators, Investigators, Challenge Takers, Self-Managers and Team Players.

As a staff we endeavour to accept only that which we believe to be a child's top effort. A successful education involves an active partnership of both home and school where respective roles are valued and supported and complement one another.

REPORTING

In 2024 we will begin real time reporting. This means that we will not be sending home a mid year paper report or an end of year report. Instead we will be continually reporting to whanau through our HERO app. This will include posts on specific learning achievements and assessments, progress within levels in reading, writing and maths, examples of work and achievement of learning goals. This is a change to traditional school reporting. We are confident that you as a parent will get a more accurate and timely report on your child's learning. We encourage parents to give constructive and positive feedback when possible.
